

Welcome to the Arizona Veterans' Memorial Cemetery



We are located at 14317 Veterans Drive in Bellemont, Arizona. When coming to visit us, please do not turn right/west on Bellemont Camp Rd. That is not a through street. You must drive straight through on Transwestern/Hughes, on the curvy road over the railroad overpass, to get to Veterans Drive, on which you will follow the signs and turn right/west to drive to the cemetery. Please do not enter the Camp Navajo Depot security gates.

AVMC-Camp Navajo is located on 60 acres surrounded by beautiful ponderosa pine, west of Flagstaff, Arizona.

The cemetery was made possible by a grant from the Department of Veterans Affairs, authorizing the state of Arizona to operate and maintain Camp Navajo.

Our first interment occurred on May 9, 2016. Reservations are not accepted. Interment is on a first come, first served basis.

BURIAL BENEFITS

Burial is open to all members of the Armed Forces including National Guard and reservists, and Veterans discharged from active duty under Honorable conditions (with certain exceptions).

Their spouses, un-remarried widow or widower, minor children, and under certain conditions, unmarried adult dependent children may also be eligible for burial. Eligible spouses may be buried even if they predecease the Veteran. Also eligible for burial are members of the reserve components of the Armed Forces, National Guard, and Reserve Officer Training Corps who die while on active duty for training or performing service, or who have 20 years of service in reserve components of the Armed Forces creditable for retired pay.

Burial in the cemetery includes a gravesite, opening and closing of the gravesite, a concrete liner (casket burials only), government marker, and perpetual care at no cost. Spaces are assigned at the time of need and may not be reserved. AVMC-Camp Navajo provides three gravesite options: in-ground casket burial, in-ground urn burial and columbarium urn burial.

COMMITTAL SERVICES

All services are held at the committal shelter rather than at the gravesite. This insures the family's safety and provides a suitable location for military honors, along with the ability of our staff to continue burial operations. The date and time of committal services are scheduled once eligibility has been determined.

BURIAL ARRANGEMENTS

The next of kin or the family's funeral director of choice may make arrangements directly with AVMC- Camp Navajo staff. Before burial can take place, cemetery staff must verify the Veteran's eligibility. To do this, the cemetery staff must be provided a copy of the Veteran's properly signed discharge papers, or the Veteran's service, Social Security, and VA claim numbers. There is no charge for interment for Veterans, and a nominal fee eligible spouses and dependents. National Guard and Reservist service members are eligible for interment, but must pay a \$948 fee plus the cost of a marker.

HONOR GUARD AND CLERGY

The engaging of clergy, buglers, and military honor guards is done by the family or the funeral home of the family's choosing. The cemetery does not provide these services.

MARKERS AND INSCRIPTIONS

Immediately after the interment, each gravesite is marked with a temporary grave marker. Within five days, the permanent marker is electronically ordered based on information provided by the family on the interment application. Delivery and installation of the marker is normally completed within 90 days.

CEMETERY PROCEDURES

The cemetery serves as a national shrine and therefore, its procedures have been designed to ensure that its beauty, dignity and reverent atmosphere are preserved. Please adhere to the following while on cemetery grounds:

- Do not bring pets
 - No picnicking
- Place all litter in refuse containers
- Place all flowers according to the floral policy

FLORAL POLICY

Fresh cut, artificial flowers and small flags are permitted. The arrangement may not be more than 24 inches high.

Permanent plantings, potted plants, statues, pin wheels, vigil lights, balloons, food items, breakable objects of any nature, grave blankets, and similar commemorative items are not permitted on graves at any time.

Floral items and/or other types of decorations attached to the headstone or marker will not be permitted. All flowers will be removed on the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month for ground maintenance operations. If the Monday falls on a state holiday, they will be removed on the following work day.

All flowers will be removed on the 1st Monday in May at the columbaria for annual cleaning. All withered flowers will be removed upon discovery.

Any floral arrangements or items that cause turf damage to include turf stressing will be removed from gravesites at time of discovery.

Glass vases or containers are not permitted. Only temporary metal or plastic floral cones are allowed. Temporary cone containers are available and are located in bins throughout the cemetery.

Only 2 floral arrangements per site are permitted on the grave year-round. Items that are removed from the gravesite will be stored for a period of 1 month. Small US flags will be placed on gravesites by designated personnel before Memorial Day and removed thereafter.

Holiday wreaths may be permitted from December 1st through January 5th.

Florists are not permitted to deliver flowers to a grave without taking away all boxes, wrapping paper or other packaging material.

The cemetery is not responsible for lost or damaged items left on gravesites.
