Bills Impacting Veterans/Military

Senate Bills

[SB1044 veterans' services; benefits counselors appropriation](#)

Appropriates \$474,200 from the State General Fund in FY21 to the Arizona Department of Veterans' Services to hire six additional veteran benefits counselors. At least two of the additional benefits counselors must be placed in Apache, Coconino or Navajo County.

[Adopted House MVA Committee Amendment](#)

Strikes the requirement that at least two of the additional benefits counselors must be placed in Apache, Coconino or Navajo County.

SB1112 veterans’ home facility; Mohave county

Appropriates \$19,000,000 from the State General Fund in FY2021 to the Arizona Department of Veterans’ Services (ADVS) to construct and establish a veterans’ home facility in Mohave county. The appropriation is intended to be this state’s share of the costs and is not subject to expenditure for any purpose unless ADVS has irrevocable commitments from the United States government to fund at least 65% of the total costs. Contains an Emergency Clause.

SB 1115 veterans overseas conflicts plates

Establishes the Veterans of Overseas Conflicts special plates if by December 31, 2020, a person pays \$32,000 to the Arizona Department of Transportation for implementation. Additionally, establishes the Veterans of Overseas Conflicts Special Plates Fund consisting of donations from the Veterans of Overseas Conflicts Special Plates. Monies from the fund shall be annually allocated to a Veterans of Foreign Wars entity located in this state, for the purposes of training and paying persons throughout this state where needed to process veterans’ claims for service-connected disabilities and illnesses.

SB 1173 appropriation; emergency shelter; transitional housing

- Appropriates \$450,000 from the state General Fund (state GF) in FY 2021 to the Department of Economic Security (DES) to distribute to the City of Cottonwood to develop a program for temporary emergency shelter and transitional housing services.

- Specifies the Department of Economic Security may only distribute the monies after the city of Cottonwood, the nonprofit entity or both commit to provide property, goods or services for the program.
- States the city of Cottonwood is to distribute the monies to an established nonprofit entity that has experience dealing with the issues of homelessness in the area.

SB 1187 Native American veterans; tax settlement

Extends the amount of time that the monies in the Veterans' Income Tax Settlement Fund revert back to the State General Fund from June 30, 2021 to June 30, 2023 and the amount of time that Arizona Department of Veterans' Services will accept applications from December 31, 2019 to December 31, 2021.

SB 1212 board licensure; certification; residents

Specifies that a person who is a resident of this state or who is a military spouse married to an active duty member and who is accompanying the member on official orders and who are seeking occupational licensing reciprocity in this state must have met the minimum education requirements and if applicable, work experience and clinical supervision requirements in the other state that were in place at the time the person was licensed or certified. Further clarifies that a person's licensure or certification by another state is proof that the person met the education requirements and, if applicable, work experience and clinical supervision requirement in effect in that state at the time of the licensure or certification.

SB 1237 veterans; income tax subtraction; increase

Increases the maximum subtraction from Arizona gross income for veteran benefits, annuities and pensions from \$3500 to the full pension amount for taxable years beginning from and after December 31, 2019. Contains a retroactive date of January 1, 2020.

SB 1238 recorder’s fees; military discharge documents

Requires a county recorder to record without fee the discharge papers of National Guard members. Contains an Emergency Clause.

SB 1394 unclaimed property; housing trust fund

Stipulates that 55% of the proceeds from the sale of abandoned property must be deposited in the Housing Trust Fund.

NOTE: Currently the first \$2,000,000 of proceeds collected from abandoned property are deposited into the SMI housing trust fund, the second \$2,000,000 is transferred to the Housing Trust Fund and the next \$24,500,000 are deposited into the Department of Revenue Administrative Fund.

Adopted Committee Amendment

Establishes the Affordable Housing Tax Credit (Tax Credit) and outlines requirements for the Tax Credit.

Proposed Senate Floor Amendment

- Prohibits the Governor, President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives from appointing more than two members of the same political party on to the Affordable Housing Tax Credit Review Committee (Committee).
- Adds the number of housing units developed and the average income of residents offered housing units to the requirements the Committee reviews.
- Changes the sunset date for the Affordable Housing Tax Credit from December 31, 2029, to December 31, 2027.

SB 1523 mental health omnibus

Directs health care insurers to comply with the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act and outlines related requirements. Grants the Department of Insurance and Financial Institutions compliance enforcement authority. Establishes the Suicide Mortality Review Team (Team) and the Mental Health Parity Advisory Committee (Advisory Committee). Establishes and appropriates \$8,000,000 to the Children's Behavioral Health Services Fund to pay for eligible behavioral health services. Among other members, the Suicide Mortality Review Team must include a representative of a veterans' organization or military family advocacy program.

SB 1524 NOW: military family relief fund; criteria

Stipulates that to be eligible for assistance from the Military and Family Relief Fund Post-9/11 Subaccount, the service member of an applying family must have been deceased, wounded or injured while deployed *to a combat zone or a zone where the service member was receiving hazardous duty pay.*

SB 1575 property tax exemptions; statutory conformity

Conditional on the voter approval of S.C.R. 1043, exempts, from property tax, the property of veterans with service or nonservice-connected disabilities who are Arizona residents.

SB1594 military installation fund; property; conveyance

Allows the Department of Emergency and Military Affairs (DEMA) to sell, lease or convey property, infrastructure or improvements acquired for the preservation or enhancement of military installations. Requires DEMA to ensure acquired property that is subsequently conveyed to another entity is used or developed in compliance with high noise and accident potential zone development standards and specifies that DEMA does not need to determine if property is not needed for the purposes of preserving or enhancing military installations before the property can be conveyed.

Subject to voter approval, amends the Constitution of Arizona to repeal sections relating to property tax exemptions and replaces the sections with one consolidated property tax exemption section.

[HB 2090 wind energy; siting](#)

Beginning on October 1, 2020, prohibits the construction or operation of a proposed individual wind turbine or any other individual structure that requires a federal aviation administration form 7460-1 and that is part of a wind energy facility from encroaching on or otherwise having a significant adverse impact on the mission, training or operations of any military installation or branch of military as determined by the military aviation and installation assurance siting clearinghouse and the federal aviation administration.

HB 2096 security guard registration; discharged veterans

Allows for a veteran who is honorably discharged from the United States military to receive a 45-day security guard registration certificate or a 45-day armed security guard registration certificate before the required background screenings for the applicant are complete. Stipulates that the veteran must have been honorably discharged and allows the veteran who receives a 45-day security guard certificate to work only for the agency licensee that provides the required preassignment training.

HB2135 veteran suicides; annual report

Adds that the report on veteran suicides in this state provided by the Arizona Department of Health Services must include utilization and encounter data for a nonprofit veterans’ services organization that provides services related to reducing suicides among this state’s military and veteran populations.

HB 2139 appropriation; veterans’ services; benefits counselors

Appropriates \$474,200 from the State General Fund, in addition to any other appropriations made in FY21, to the Arizona Department of Veterans’ Services to hire additional benefits counselors.

HB 2184 occupational and professional licensure; notice

Requires a printed statement on all license and certificate applications, regulating entity websites and all communications with a potential licensee that informs the applicant that they will be granted an occupational or professional license or certificate if the applicant has been licensed or certified in another state for at least one year, in the same discipline, at the same practice level and meets the conditions outlined in existing statute pertaining to occupational licensing reciprocity for military spouses and those establishing residency in this state. Clarifies that the criteria for the licensing requirements must be made clear on the regulating entity's website and license and application forms; and strikes the requirement that it be included in all communications with the person seeking certification.

HB 2265 Enduring Freedom Memorial; appropriation

Allows the Department of Administration (ADOA) to use appropriated monies from the State Monument and Memorial Repair Fund (SMMRF) to alter or modify the Enduring Freedom Memorial to add additional names to the memorial. Additionally, appropriates \$21,422.91 from the SMMRF to ADOA in FY21 to alter or modify the Enduring Freedom Memorial to add additional names to the memorial.

HB 2286 appropriation; wastewater treatment infrastructure

Appropriates \$5,000,000 from the State General Fund in FY21 to the Department of Environmental Quality to distribute to the city of Glendale for costs associated with the construction of water reclamation and wastewater treatment infrastructure in the vicinity of Luke Air Force Base in Maricopa County.

HB 2288 state licensing; fee waiver

Provides an initial occupation licensing fee waiver for any active duty service members, their spouses and Arizona veterans.

HB 2310 appropriation; military installation projects

FISCAL NOTE

The bill would increase state General Fund costs by an estimated \$2.3 million in FY 2021 and \$3.5 million annually thereafter as the state makes additional ASRS contributions for new hires. In addition, the bill would slightly reduce the ASRS contribution rate. However, ASRS does not have an actuarial estimate for the lower contribution rate. When this 6- month policy was originally enacted in FY 2012, ASRS estimated it would increase the contribution rate by 0.13%. If the ASRS contribution rate follows the same percent change, accounting for the change in contributions from 6 months to 5 months (0.11%), then there would be partially offsetting General Fund savings of \$(633,000). In total, the net impact of SB 1125 would be an annual General Fund cost increase of \$1.7 million in FY 2021 and \$2.8 million annually thereafter.

- The institution has not been subject to an enforcement action within the year preceding the annual licensing fee anniversary date.

HB 2538 health care workers; assault; prevention

- States that it is aggravated assault if a person commits an assault knowing or having reason to know that the victim is a health care worker while engaged in the health care worker’s duties and makes it a class 5 felony if the assault involves a physical injury.
- Requires health care employers to develop, implement and maintain a written workplace violence prevention plan that must be available at all times to all health care workers and contractors.
- Requires health care employers to investigate a workplace violence incident as soon as practicable and review the circumstances of the incident, solicit input from all of those involved, and document the findings, recommendations and corrective measures taken for each investigation conducted.
- Requires health care employers to provide training and education to its health care workers who may be exposed to workplace violence.
