Senate Bills

[SB 1024 Enduring Freedom Memorial; appropriation](#)

Allows the Department of Administration (ADOA) to use appropriated monies from the State Monument and Memorial Repair Fund (SMMRF) to alter or modify the Enduring Freedom Memorial to add additional names to the memorial. Additionally, appropriates \$21,422.91 from the SMMRF to ADOA in FY22 to alter or modify the Enduring Freedom Memorial to add additional names to the memorial.

[SB 1143 veterans overseas conflicts plates](#)

Establishes the Veterans of Overseas Conflicts special plates if by December 31, 2021, a person pays \$32,000 to the Arizona Department of Transportation for implementation. Additionally, establishes the Veterans of Overseas Conflicts Special Plates Fund consisting of donations from the Veterans of Overseas Conflicts Special Plates. Monies from the fund shall be annually allocated to a Veterans of

Foreign Wars entity located in this state, for the purposes of training and paying persons throughout this state where needed to process veterans' claims for service-connected disabilities and illnesses.

SB 1149 occupational and professional licensure notice.

Requires a printed statement on all license and certificate applications, regulating entity websites and all communications with a potential licensee that informs the applicant that they will be granted an occupational or professional license or certificate if the applicant has been licensed or certified in another state for at least one year, in the same discipline, at the same practice level and meets the conditions outlined in existing statute pertaining to occupational licensing reciprocity for military spouses and those establishing residency in this state.

SB 1161 technical correction; military; special plates

Makes a technical correction pertaining to military support special plates.

SB 1172 veterans' home facility; Mohave County

Appropriates \$25,000,000 from the State General Fund in FY22 to the Arizona Department of Veterans' Services (ADVS) to construct and establish a veterans' home facility in Mohave County. The appropriation is intended to be this state's share of the costs and is not subject to expenditure for any purpose unless ADVS has irrevocable commitments from the United States government to fund at least 65% of the total costs. Contains an Emergency Clause.

SB 1229 technical correction; bingo license; transfer

Makes a technical correction.

SB 1260 property tax exemptions; statutory conformity

Conditional on the voter approval of S.C.R. 1019, exempts, from property tax, the property of veterans with service or nonservice-connected disabilities who are Arizona residents.

SB 1312 veterans; special license plates; design.

Establishes the Veterans of Overseas Conflicts Auxiliary special plates if by December 31, 2021, a person pays \$32,000 to the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) for implementation. Additionally, establishes the Veterans of Overseas Conflicts Auxiliary Special Plates Fund consisting of donations from the Veterans of Overseas Conflicts Auxiliary Special Plates. Monies from the fund shall be annually allocated to a Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary entity located in this state for the purposes of using the monies to fund its charitable works.

SB 1331 veterans’ income tax; exemption

Increases the maximum subtraction from Arizona gross income for veteran benefits, annuities and pensions from \$3500 to the full pension amount for taxable years beginning from and after December 31, 2020. Contains a retroactive date of January 1, 2021.

SB 1359 veterans’ income tax; exemption.

Increases the maximum subtraction from Arizona gross income for veteran benefits, annuities and pensions from \$3500 to the full pension amount for taxable years beginning from and after December 31, 2020. Contains a retroactive date of January 1, 2021.

SB 1360 G&F; veterans; hunting; fishing; licenses

Allows a Veteran of the Armed Forces who has a complimentary license to transfer a permit or tag to another person for the purpose of assisting the Veteran in the taking of wildlife or taking wildlife on behalf of the Veteran as the Veteran’s proxy. Additionally, provides reduced license fees for a Veteran who has been a resident of this state for one year or more immediately before applying for the license and a nonresident license for the same fee as a resident license to a veteran or military member who is not a resident of this state.

SB 1361 concealed weapons permit; fees; application

Prohibits the Director of the Department of Public Safety from charging an initial or renewal application fee for a concealed weapons permit to a person who has been a resident of this state for at least one year before the date of application and who is currently serving in the Armed Forces of the United States, is a Veteran with an honorable discharge or general discharge under honorable conditions or is a current or retired peace officer in this state.

SB 1363 veterans; surviving spouses; government parking

Requires each state agency having jurisdiction over street parking or publicly owned and operated parking facility to provide specially designated and marked motor vehicle parking spaces for the exclusive use of Veterans or the Veteran’s surviving spouse and outlines requirements for where the parking spaces must be located.

SB 1411 technical correction; military affairs

Makes a technical correction.

SB 1443 military family relief fund

- Expands eligibility criteria to include a service member of an applying family who has established residency in this state and be able to provide proof of continuous physical presence in this state for at least twelve months before submitting an application.
- States that the financial need must be a result of the service member's military service.
- Establishes a deployment date requirement of before September 11, 2001 for applications to the Pre-9/11 MFRF subaccount and after September 11, 2001 for applications to the Post-9/11 subaccount.
- Allows the Director to allocate up to ten percent of the donations received for the actual reasonable costs of administering the subaccounts and the financial assistance program including the hiring of an employee to process applications and provide support to the committee
- Defines "established residency" and "continuous physical presence".

SB 1447 military installation fund; property conveyance

Allows the Arizona Department of Emergency and Military Affairs (DEMA) to sell, convey, lease or sublease any property, related infrastructure or improvement acquired for the preservation or enhancement of military installations.

SB 1559 Native American veterans; tax settlement

Extends the amount of time that the monies in the Veterans' Income Tax Settlement Fund revert to the State General Fund from June 30, 2021 to June 30, 2024 and the amount of time that Arizona Department of Veterans' Services will accept applications from December 31, 2019 to December 31, 2022.

SB 1560 tribal nations; veterans' services; appropriation

Appropriates \$2,200,000 and 20 FTE positions from the State General Fund in FY22 to the Arizona Department of Veterans' Services to hire veteran service officers to provide services in rural tribal nations in this state that have communities that are located 100 miles or more from the nearest United States Department of Veterans Affairs Service Center. Contains a legislative intent clause that the monies appropriated for this purpose must be collected and identified from revenues collected on Indian reservations in this state.

[SB1567 Lukachukai veterans' multipurpose complex; appropriation](#)

Appropriates \$500,000 from the State General Fund in FY22 to the Arizona Department of Veterans' Services to distribute to the Navajo Nation for costs associated with planning, designing and constructing the Lukachukai Veterans' Multipurpose Complex.

Major Actions: 01 Feb 2021- First Read and assigned to the Senate Appropriations and Rules Committees.

[SB 1568 Fort Defiance veterans cemetery; appropriation](#)

Appropriates \$30,000 from the State General Fund in FY22 to the Arizona Department of Veterans' Services to distribute to the Navajo Nation for costs associated with improvements to the Fort Defiance Veterans Memorial Cemetery.

[SB 1569 Ganado center building; appropriation](#)

Appropriates \$976,300 from the State General Fund in FY22 to the Arizona Department of Housing to distribute to the Navajo Nation for costs associated with designing and constructing the Ganado Veterans' and senior citizens' center building.

[SB 1797 fantasy sports betting; event wagering](#)

Makes numerous changes to statutes related to gaming including, after the conditions for enactment of this legislation are met, authorizing the Arizona State Lottery Commission to establish and operate a single "electronic keno game" and a single "mobile draw game" on a centralized computer system controlled by the lottery that allows a player to place wagers, view the outcome of a game and receive winnings over the internet, including on personal electronic devices. The bill further specifies that an electronic keno game may be operated only within an "authorized keno location," defined as a physical

facility with a specified gaming license that is a fraternal organization, veterans' organization, racetrack enclosure, or wagering facility where pari-mutuel wagering is conducted.

SB 1802 Diné; indigenous code talkers; holiday

Establishes August 14 as “National Diné and Indigenous Code Talkers Day.”

SCR 1006 military personnel; technical correction

Makes a technical change to replace, “soldier, seaman, or Marine in the Army or Navy” with “military personnel.”

SCR 1019 constitutional property tax exemptions

Subject to voter approval, amends the Constitution of Arizona to repeal sections relating to property tax exemptions and replaces the sections with one consolidated property tax exemption section and allows the Legislature to exempt the following:

- Property of an educational, charitable or religious association or institution that is not used or held for profit;
- Personal property that is used in a trade or business or for agricultural purposes;
- Cemeteries that are set apart and used to inter deceased human beings;
- The property of a widow or widower who is an Arizona resident;
- Property of an Arizona resident who is at least 18 years-old and has a medically certified total and permanent disability; and
- The property of an honorably discharged veteran who is an Arizona resident with a service or non-service-related disability as determined by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.

SCR 1027 property tax exemption; veterans; disabilities

Amends the Arizona Constitution to allow the Legislature to property tax exemptions on the primary residence owned by a Veteran, Veteran’s spouse if certain criteria is met. Directs the Secretary of the State to submit this proposition to the voters at the next General Election.

HB 2003 military justice; technical correction

Makes a technical correction.

Removes the prohibition relating to conducting a lottery or raffle within a 12-hour period before or after a bingo occasion or game and increases the gross receipt amounts for each license classification as follows:

- Class A license, from \$15,600 to \$75,000;
- Class B license, from \$300,000 to \$500,000; and
- Class C license, from \$300,000 to \$500,000.

Increases the threshold amount for cash prizes to be paid by check from amounts over \$150 to amounts over \$1,100.

HB 2128 state licensing; fee waivers

Requires that the occupational licensing fee be waived for any active duty military service member and the member's spouse or for any Veteran if the individual is applying for that specific license in this site for the first time.

Proposed Committee Amendment:

Removes the requirement that the occupational licensing fee be waived for any Veteran if the individual is applying for that specific license in this site for the first time.

Appropriates \$9,000,000 from the State General Fund in FY22 to the Department of Veterans' Services to distribute to the Navajo nation for the design and construction of a veterans nursing home in Chinle agency.

HB 2219 appropriations; capital projects; Navajo Nation

Requires the Superintendent of Financial Institutions to examine or caused to be examined, at the Superintendent's discretion, consumer lenders and premium finance companies at their discretion to ensure compliance with the federal Military Lending Act.

Bases the allowable military leave period for officers and employees of this state, any county, city or town or any agency or political subdivision of this state or a county, city or town on the average total of regularly scheduled hours worked in a biweekly period as follows:

- A full-time officer or employee who works two thousand eighty hours annually is entitled to up to one hundred twenty hours of military leave annually and up to two hundred forty hours in any two consecutive years.
- An officer or employee who is regularly scheduled to work more than two thousand eighty hours annually is entitled to fifteen days of military leave each fiscal year based on the total number of hours in the individual's regularly scheduled biweekly hours.

Adds that the report on veteran suicides in this state provided by the Arizona Department of Health Services must include utilization and encounter data for a nonprofit veterans' services organization that provides services related to reducing suicides among this state's military and veteran populations.

Requires all state agencies, boards and commissions or other administrative units of this state to ask every individual at the initial point of service with that individual and to print on each application form the following question: “Have you or a family member ever served in the military?” and to provide a website address and contact information for ADVS and the Be Connected program to individuals who answer in the affirmative. Contains a delayed effective date of January 1, 2022.

- Contains a delayed effective date of January 1, 2023.

- Basic life support, including initiating immediate CPR before the arrival of emergency medical services to a resident who experiences symptoms or cardiac arrest or cessation of respiration and in accordance with the resident’s advance directives and do-not-resuscitate order. Staff who are certified in CPR must be available at all times.
- First Aid before the arrival of emergency medical services to a resident who experiences emergency illness or injury and to a noninjured resident who has fallen and is unable to reasonable recover independently and in accordance with the resident’s advance directives and do-not-resuscitate order. Staff who are certified in First Aid must be available at all times.

represented by that person and requires the person lobbying to file a copy of the written consent with the secretary of state within two days after the conflict of interest occurs.

Contains an Emergency Clause.

- The licensed premises of a public event or public establishment that has a liquor license under A.R.S. Title 4;
- A state, county or municipal judicial department, law enforcement agency or correctional facility;
- An area where firearm possession is prohibited by federal law;
- An educational institution defined in A.R.S. § 13-2911;
- A community college district or a university under the jurisdiction of the Arizona Board of Regents;
- Facilities operated by the Arizona State Hospital; or
- A public establishment that is a vehicle or craft.

Defines "Secured Facility" as:

- A public establishment or public event that has security personnel and electronic weapons screening devices at each entrance;
- A public establishment or public event with security personnel who screen each person and require every person carrying a weapon to leave it in temporary and secure storage; or
- The area of a public event or public establishment that is not generally accessible to the public and has:
 - Security personnel, or
 - Biometric, coded or employee-restricted entry to limit access.

HB 2620 health care workers; assault; prevention

- States that it is aggravated assault if a person commits an assault knowing or having reason to know that the victim is a health care worker while engaged in the health care worker's duties and makes it a class 5 felony if the assault involves a physical injury.
- Requires health care employers to develop, implement and maintain a written workplace violence prevention plan that must be available at all times to all health care workers and contractors.
- Requires health care employers to investigate a workplace violence incident as soon as practicable and review the circumstances of the incident, solicit input from all of those involved, and document the findings, recommendations and corrective measures taken for each investigation conducted.
- Requires health care employers to provide training and education to its health care workers who may be exposed to workplace violence.

Adopted Committee Amendment

- Stipulates that the specified penalties do not apply to a person who does not have the ability to form the culpable mental state because of a mental disability.
- States language relating to the workplace violence prevention plan does not apply to the Arizona State Hospital (ASH) or other licensed facility under the jurisdiction of the ASH superintendent.
- Defines mental disability.

Requires the Governor's Regulatory Review Council (GRRC) to review the practice, policy, rule, or requirement on receipt of a petition to review an existing agency practice, substantive policy statement, final rule, or regulatory licensing requirement that the petitioner alleges violates state law, is not authorized by statute, is unduly burdensome or is not demonstrated to be necessary to fulfill a public health, safety or welfare concern.

NOTE: Currently, GRRC is required to review the petition only if the practice, policy, rule or requirement applied to a profession for which the average wage in that profession in Arizona does not exceed 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines for a family of four.
